Addressing the Projected Physician Shortage with a GME Expansion:

Like many communities in the United States, the Cincinnati area will face a significant shortage of physicians, most notably in primary care, in the next decade due to a combination of factors:

- Baby Boomer physicians are preparing to leave the workforce
- Competitive salaries in more lucrative medical fields draw talent away from interest in primary care practice or emergency medicine.
- Fewer opportunities for medical internships exist compared to the number of medical school graduates, making GME training more difficult to obtain.

Because it takes many years to train a doctor, these shortages must be addressed now, so that Greater Cincinnati patients will have access to the care they need in the future.

In 1850, as a cholera epidemic swept through Cincinnati and claimed thousands of lives, the city's Jewish population The Jewish Hospital-Mercy Health's Education Center opened in 2019 and was fully funded through philanthropy.

responded to this outbreak with action and compassion. Sounding a call to arms to help indigent Jews affected by the disease, community leaders created the first Jewish hospital in the United States right here in the Queen City.

As our nation's first Jewish hospital, The Jewish Hospital — Mercy Health embodies a unique legacy of caring that touches the lives of patients and their loved ones throughout the region. Known for innovation and advanced clinical expertise in a wide range of specialties, they are also America's first Jewish teaching hospital when it welcomed it's first intern in 1895, the legacy continues today training the next generation of physicians in the fields of internal medicine, general surgery and podiatry.

According to the Association of American Medical Colleges, a nationwide primary care physician shortage of between 21,400 and 55,200 is projected by 2033. Studies tell us that GME programs have effects beyond enriching a medical student's life and career:

- **Job Creation:** Communities within 100 miles of a GME Program boast significantly more physicians per capita than similar communities without such programs.
- Cost Savings to Taxpayers: Honoring the Mercy Health mission, many of our medical resident programs are placed in clinics that serve low-income populations. GME Programs improve access to care for underinsured patients, while saving are made through better care coordination and decreases in unnecessary hospitalizations and a reduction in use of emergency care by uninsured patients.
- Improved Care Quality: Observational studies have shown a greater overall quality of care among teaching hospitals compared to non-teaching hospitals, because the simple presence of a teaching program attracts the very best, experienced physicians who are specifically attracted to practicing in a teaching-learning environment.
- **Stronger Local Hospitals:** Studies indicate that all local community hospitals see significant savings in recruitment costs for every locally-trained GME resident they hire, enabling investment in other efforts in patient care and community health.

Caring for the poor and vulnerable

What sets us apart, our faith-based mission, is visible in our GME Program as it strengthens our ability to serve the poor and most vulnerable in our community by providing more professionals who can delivery hands-on care. Community-oriented outpatient service projects sponsored by our GME Program, such as vaccination clinics, school-based health education programs, and nursing home support, will result in better health outcomes, improved quality of care, and better patient experiences. Mercy Health's GME Program expansion provides essential care to those that need it the most, and in turn, makes a big difference in the general health and wellness of our community.
